Summary:

This report is a translation of a Polish document, classified SECRET OF SPECIAL IMPORTANCE, entitled "Outline of Crisis Management Plan." The document in chart form lists in chronological order the steps:

- to be taken prior to the promulgation of martial law,
- to bring about this state gradually and without public announcement,
- to gain the element of surprise by creeping toward martial law.

It also outlines actions to be taken by civilian and military authorities at the time of promulgation, and subsequently, and in the event of a general strike or civil disorder.
