Office of Policy Coordination and Kennan Discussion of the American Committee for Liberation

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Summary:

Frank Wisner solicits George Kennan's suggestions on the organization of AMCOMLIB (cryptonym Cinderella) and the composition of its board of directors.

Cinderella Discussion with Mr. Kennan of 21 August 1950

1. A final meeting was held with Mr. Kennan before his departure from the Department in his office at 11 a.m. on 21 August 1950 attended by Messrs. Kennan, Wisner, and The short memorandum outlining OPC's views on the composition of the committee and the selection of an executive secretary was shown to Messrs. Kennan and who approved it.

 - c. William Y. Elliet
 - d. Eugene Lyons
 - e. Kurt Reissinger
 - f. Alan Wardwell
 - g. Matthew Woll
- 3. It was agreed that Mr. Kennan would within the next few weeks speak with Messrs. Wasson, Wardwell and Reissinger and inform them that Mr. Chamberlain would appreach them about the formation of the committee which had his, Mr. Kennan's, blessing. Mr. Kennan would ask Mr. Wasson if he would be willing to serve as treasurer of the committee and, if he would not, would ask him to suggest someone, perhaps Mr. Wardwell er perhaps someone else, to act in this capacity. A representative of OPC would approach Mr. Chamberlain and request him to act as president and as such to make an official approach to the prespective committee members. It was agreed that the members of the committee should be told the truth about who was behind the project and what its real purpose was.
