Subject: Operations in France.

In commenting on the operations in France, Marshal Stalin stated: "They are most bold and daring. Great risks have been taken in driving wedges in the German lines. But no success can be attained without risks. The operations in the west have never been equalled here."

The Marshal indicated satisfaction at the plans to take the Ruhr and remarked that when the Russians took Katowice and the Upper Silesia, Germany would be deprived of her coal and much of her industry.

The British Ambassador commented briefly upon para-troop operations near Arnhem. He then inquired whether the Marshal would like to prophesy as to when Berlin would be taken. Marshal Stalin stated that he was a bad prophet and did not like to make prophecies since he might be wrong. He remarked that the Germans were extremely tenacious and stubborn.
